ROLLING THUNDER THE TUNES of our VIETNAM

Cumberland and Ashfield RSL members recently made a Saturday afternoon journey to the Sydney State Theatre to view the stage ,musical production **Rolling Thunder Vietnam**.

An emotional, richly rewarding musical and narrative experience that takes you to the heart of the highly divisive Vietnam War. Featuring 20 of the most affecting songs of the era, Rolling Thunder Vietnam open the hopes and fears of the young soldiers who went into battle. It also looks at the impact on their loved ones left behind and the reception the troops received upon their return home.

Writer Bryce Hallett conducted extensive research, including numerous interviews with veterans and family members, as well as relying upon many letters exchanged. Supported by video footage, this was a power-packed show, which cuts to the quick. The protest songs and potent rock anthems presented were masterfully packaged into a searing reminder of the conflict.

The musical numbers of Steppenwolf, The Rolling Stones, Creedence Clearwater Revival, Gladys Knight, Billy Thorpe, Paul

Simon and many more legendary artists. Think Magic Carpet Ride, The Real Thing, Fortunate Son, The Letter, Black Magic Woman, Help Me Make it Through the Night, War and Bridge Over Troubled Water had many in the audience singing from their seats,

Tom Oliver plays larrikin country soldier Johnny and Brittanie Shipway his girlfriend, Sarah. Jerrod Smith is cast as duty-bound American marine Thomas and Christian Charisiou the conscripted Aussie, Andy. Rounding out the cast are Imogen Moore and Sam Richardson, both of whom appeared in Frozen The Musical. The five-piece band (drums, keyboards, two guitarists and a bass) under musical director Chong Lim was inspiring. Directed by David Berthold, Rolling Thunder Vietnam was very highly received by large audiences.

Certainly a highlight for our RSL members who were just a small part of many RSL Service Veterans who witnessed this perforce during its brief Sydney visit, as part of the national tour during July and August.



Back in the 1970s and 1980s the national RSL league was dominated by the huge numbers of Second World War ex-servicemen and women. As a body the League was not very welcoming to the younger Nashos and Vietnam veterans. Hence separate organisations emerged.

Times have now changed.

Almost all the Second World War veterans have passed away so now Nashos and Vietnam vets make up a large percentage of all ex-servicemen across Australia today. It is time for a consolidation of veterans' charities. We all have the one purpose. It is time to rethink our traditions and practices and get together for the benefit of veterans and their families.

NATIONAL SERVICEMEN'S MEMORIAL


Recently RSL NSW Cumberland vice-president Ron Inglis, attended a ceremony in Burwood Park at the National Servicemen's Memorial.


The event commemorated the service of over 60,000 Australians who served in various national service schemes between 1952 and 1972.

For many years the service of these conscripts was unrecognised but then, from the 1990s, communities across Australia erected memorials to national servicemen, especially to the some 200 who paid the supreme sacrifice.
